

# A Guide to the Sixth Form Dress Code

### Rationale

Members of ICC Sixth Form provide role models for our younger students. They convey to wider audiences the professional outlook of the College. It is important therefore that standards of appearance are high and reflect our aims. In particular, our aims include high expectations and responsibility.

Sixth Form students are expected to wear business dress in a manner that is appropriate for study that reflects positively their individual identity and values of the Sixth Form.

The pages in this booklet give guidelines as to what is considered appropriate business dress. It is not possible to give a definitive guide, but we ask students to consider the uniform expectations of the other students and dress code of adults working in the building when choosing what to wear in the Sixth Form.

Clothing should be modest and in keeping with the working environment, and we ask students to remember that their choice of dress impacts upon the overall impression of Ifield Community College.



## What to wear

#### **Male Students**

#### Male students must wear:

- Full-length tailored trousers.
- Formal shirt with a collar.
- Tie.
- Formal shoes.

#### In addition, male students may wear:

- Blazer or suit jacket.
- Knitted jumper.



#### **Female Students**

#### Female students must wear:

- Full-length tailored trousers or formal skirt.
- Blouse or alternative smart top (with straps of one inch or wider) OR smart dress.
- Formal shoes.

## In addition, female students may wear:

- Blazer or suit jacket.
- Knitted jumper or cardigan.

# **What NOT to wear**

The following clothes are not acceptable and should not be worn:

- ☑ Jeans or other denim, combat trousers, tracksuits, or leggings
- Skin-tight clothing inc. trousers, skirts, tops or dresses.
- Leather (excluding belts and shoes).
- Casual checked shirts shirts/blouses must be business wear.
- ▼ T-shirts, shorts, hats or other beachwear.
- ☑ Clothing with large or offensive messages, logos, branding or images.
- Sweatshirts, hooded tops or other sportswear.
- Any item of clothing that could be considered revealing or inappropriate.
- Jewellery that would create a health and safety risk. Piercings should be in ears only.
